

Subject Coverage	
Literacy	We will be reading Berlie Doherty's <i>Street Child</i> , analysing how authors convey characters and setting through their vocabulary and structure. We will be revising key grammatical terms and punctuation—helping the children to develop greater sophistication in their writing.
Maths	This term we are starting the Inspire scheme in maths which will help us develop our fluency, reasoning and problem solving. We are starting with a transition unit to help the children adapt to this new way of working which will cover place value, number and addition and subtraction.
Science	Children will be learning about Inheritance and Evolution—they will investigate the work of pioneers in this field including Mary Anning. They will learn about the king- doms of classification and understand that organisms inherit characteristics through their genes.
History	In history this term we will be focussing on life in Victorian Britain and the changes that the Industrial Revolution brought about—including mass production. Their visit to the Black Country Museum is a great way to immerse them into the how life was different in the Victorian era.
Computing	We will predominantly be learning about how to keep safe online and how you can and should report unwanted behaviours and content, including choosing pass- words to keep data safe. In addition, the children will be taught how to use a green screen to add backgrounds to their Victorian photograph.
D and T	Children will be learning how to make an item of Victorian clothing, including cut- ting from a pattern, pinning and sewing. They will use both machine and hand stitching and evaluate when the use of each is most appropriate.
R.E.	Children will be learning about Christian and Buddhist practices and the similari- ties and differences between the two religions.
P.E.	We will be learning about defence and attack strategies through basketball. In addition to this, we will develop our ball skills.
SMSC	In year 6, we will be following world news through Burnett News, developing curi- osity, scepticism and storytelling. They are able to access this website at home and post comments in a safe online forum.
French	Children will continue developing their understanding of the French language, focussing on Sport.
